Our Strategic Development Plan

Summary Achievements 2007-2008

Each year we examine key aspects of our development under four main headings:

Learning and Growth: This reflects the extent to which our organisation is consistently evaluating and reviewing its operations and supports staff, volunteers and users to have a clear vision of the needs of our client group we serve, in the context of living in Scotland in the 21st Century.

Stakeholders: All those who have an impact on the Association, for example, users, supporters, funders, central and local government and any other interested parties or external factors which may impact on the work we do.

Internal Systems: This looks at how we manage the organisation operationally.

Financial and Legal: We examine ways in which we evaluate our financial controls and systems and other areas of compliance and governance.

The Mission

"The Scottish Spina Bifida Association seeks to increase public awareness and understanding of individuals with Spina Bifida/Hydrocephalus and allied conditions. It aims to support all those affected to identify their needs and to empower them to make informed choices and decisions."

Annual Review - 2008 Achievements and Performance

The Association continues to offer a wide range of services to over 3000 users in Scotland and is continuing to be called upon to provide information, support and guidance to a wide range of professionals.

In November 2007, our Honorary Patron, Gordon Ramsay OBE, Presided at the Association's First prestigious Gala Dinner at Stirling Castle. Over £130,000 was raised on the evening. In January 2008, our Burns Supper Committee organised their annual events in the Hilton Glasgow and the Roxburgh Hotel Edinburgh to further increase our funds significantly from corporate donations.

With the appointment of a new Services and Development Manager in August 2007 the organisation has begun the process of enriching and developing the range of direct services offered to our "users". The core service delivery arm of the Association continues to be the Family Support Service which offers individualised support for families, children, young people and adults with spina bifida or hydrocephalus throughout Scotland. In addition, the success of the pilot healthcheck Project has developed even further with the first reviews of young adults being undertaken over the winter months. Our thanks are due to our volunteer nursing staff who have ensured that the project has developed from strength to strength.

At a national level the Association has been significant in influencing the debate around the redesign of Neurosciences services and in particular neurosurgery through its involvement in the Scottish Government's Neurosciences Implementation Group. A specialist workstream on developing a paediatric pathway for children who have shunts has been meeting over the past months. Our Association has been ably represented by Tracey Rendall, as our parent representative.

Despite the Food Standard Agency last year having agreed to recommend to Ministers in all four countries that Flour should be fortified with Folic Acid in order to reduce the incidence of neural tube defects (NTD's), the Chief Medical Officer in England and Wales has stalled progress in the UK for a further 18 months in order to carry out further research. We will continue to exert pressure along with our sister organisation in England, Wales and Northern Ireland (ASBAH) to ensure that progress is not further delayed. Mandatory Flour fortification would significantly improve the health of the nation and most importantly would reduce the incidence of neural tube defects by approx 30%.

Future Developments

A one day course for professionals on all aspects of spina Bifida and hydrocephalus is planned for the early part of the new financial year, as is the commencement of a young adults group and a new parents group to be held at our new Family Support Centre. Subject to increased funding, we also plan to roll out the successful "healthcheck clinics" under the banner of "the Health Living Project" and to offer these innovative and holistic clinics to adult users throughout Scotland. Also in the coming year in conjunction with the Royal Hospital for Sick Children in Yorkhill we plan to trial some of the combined spina bifida clinics for children in the West of Scotland at the Dan Young Building. Work is currently being done to ensure that clinicians can access Yorkhill's Hospital Information System and Picture Archiving software (to view scans) remotely.


